LOVING GOD LOVING EACH OTHER LOVING THE WORLD

From The Pastor

Can you guess what the most watched TV episode of all time is? The farewell episode of MASH that ran in February 1983. The cease-fire ending the fighting in the Korean War has been announced and the characters in the series who've wanted to go home the whole time they were in Korea, some find it hard to say goodbye. One is Hawkeye Pierce's dear friend BJ Hunnicut, BJ doesn't want to say those two short and simple words "goodbye." Because to him goodbye means goodbye forever. It means he will never see Hawkeye again and that for the rest of his life, he'll have to live without that daily friendship he was so accustomed to having during the Korean War. So BJ opts to pretend that he and Hawkeye will keep in touch with Christmas cards and annual visits to medical conventions or each other's homes. And he won't say goodbye - until the end of the episode, when Hawkeye flies off in a helicopter and sees that BJ has spelled out, in large stones on the ground, the simple message - Goodbye.

I'm finding it hard to say goodbye too. After today:

I won't be standing up here on Sundays sharing what I've learned by studying the word of God...won't be standing up in the front row singing at the contemporary service and occasionally trying to clap in rhythm with the music, a skill I've not quite mastered.

Won't be visiting you in the hospital when you've had a baby and get to hold your newborn or baptize you or your children or cry with you when someone has died or pray with you before surgery...

Won't see you regularly as we do on Sundays or Super Seniors or Theology on Tap...

Won't be getting together with your church staff to laugh and pray and work together...

It's the prospect of no longer seeing, being with, people I love like I do you guys that is the hardest part about saying goodbye...

But there is something beautiful about the word goodbye - it comes from Elizabethan English, a contraction of "God be with ye" - it's a word of blessing - not a word of final parting so much as a word of blessing - that God be with you wherever you go.

As the Presbyterian pastor Frederick Buechner notes:

A woman with a scarf over her head hoists her six-year-old up onto the first step of the school bus. "Goodbye," she says... It was a long while ago that the words 'God be with you' disappeared into the word 'goodbye," but every now and again some trace of them still glimmers through."

Here's how I will say goodbye - God be with you - by thanking you, by asking your forgiveness, and by blessing you.

From The Pastor -

Thank you

Susan and I moved to Chambersburg in the beginning of December 2012 and on the first Friday of the month came downtown to see the Christmas lights, to see Central decorated for Christmas -the church was open for prayer and meditation - and we climbed up the stairs into the Sanctuary and were amazed at the beauty of the church - the lights were dimmed and candles lit and Christmas music was playing in the background and several church members were there and greeted us and you could feel the presence of God in the place - it was a sacred moment I'll never forget and I felt a profound sense of welcome, of rightness, in becoming your pastor that set the tone for the next twelve years. And I have a lot, to thank God for in being with you as your pastor.

I thank God for how you've opened your lives to Susan and me - you've invited me as your pastor to share some of the most beautiful moments of your lives - presiding at your weddings, your children's weddings, letting me come to the hospital and hold and pray for your newborn babies, giving me the privilege of baptizing those babies. Sharing dinner with you at your homes and at restaurants. And you invited me to share some of the hardest moments of your lives - I sat and prayed over your loved ones during the last moments of their lives; I conducted funerals and entrusted them into the love of God in Christ; you shared your heartaches and troubles with me and we talked and prayed together; you invited me to visit with you and pray with you before surgery, when you were sick and hurting and in the hospital - when you were in crisis. You shared yourselves with me, you trusted me, we've laughed and cried together and I am profoundly grateful and though I'm retiring from being your pastor you will always have a place in my heart.

And I thank God for your children - I'm grateful for the times I participated in Vacation Bible School and was invited to let my inner goofball come out, playing biblical characters in bad costumes. I'm grateful for Abbie's little notes she gives me on Sunday mornings, for Will's hugs around the knees, for Christmas pageants where you never knew just what was going to happen - for watching your kids grow up - I'm thankful even for when you played stump the chump with me - your kids ask you a hard question, like, where did God come from? and you'd say, Go ask Pastor Scott.

Thank you for allowing me to walk alongside you on your journeys of faith. I think of the Going Deeper Bible study that met Mondays at 7am to study the gospel of Mark, the Wednesday night gatherings - Bible studies and book discussions - at Roy Pitz and Nathan Miller and The Pub - thank you for understanding the value of getting out into the community instead of always staying within the walls of the church building. I think of the many pastoral conversations we had to think through hard questions of faith, when you were struggling with doubt, when you were trying to discern the will of God, when you just needed to talk to someone - and you trusted me.

And I thank God for how you are a congregation that loves one another. The love of Christ is in this church - the way you pray for one another and do meal trains and send each other cards and call and check on one another. By how you have a board of deacons who visit and care for the elderly and shut-ins of the church. And the way you cared for me when I had my bike accident and broke my pelvis - coming over and rearranging our downstairs to make room for a hospital bed, bringing us food and gift cards and coming to sit with me and praying for us - Susan and I have said repeatedly we don't know what we would have done without you. Jesus said that the world will know we are his disciples by how we love one another - and you guys do that.

Thank you for being a church willing to try new things. Like switching the times of the worship services - wasn't that fun? Like the Thanksgiving Community Dinner a few months ago. Like all the support you gave Erin as she developed and offered the amazing productions of the Passion of the Christ, and And So.

I also thank God for being a church that likes to have fun together. Some of my absolute favorite memories here are the pancake supper and variety shows our youth group has sponsored, and especially I and some other large men presenting interpretative dances, to the music of Ride of the Valkyries and the 1812 Overture.

From The Pastor -

I thank God for the staff colleagues I've served with. I have served as pastor in four different churches. I have friends in ministry that have served in dozens more. I read a lot about challenges facing church staff. And I can tell you that Central's church staff is not only the best I've ever served with, it is one of the best I've ever heard of. Not just in terms of talent, work ethic, creativity - though the staff has those qualities in abundance - but in the myriad ways the staff challenges, supports, collaborates with and cares for one another. There are no turf wars; no jealousy, no competition. Rather, the staff is a group of Christ-followers who genuinely enjoy one another (not that we never fussed at each other!) and who are dedicated to serving Christ through Central Presbyterian. One of the hardest things about stepping away, is that I won't get to see them, be with them, regularly anymore.

I thank God that Central is a church that lives its vision to share the heart of Christ from the heart of the city. Starting Diaper Depot that was just an idea in Dani Kardisco's head that has now become one of the most important ministries in our community, serving hundreds every month; the Blessing Box, the Pastor's Benevolence Fund you entrusted to me, the amazing work the Missions Team has done serving the Al-Ali refugee family, youth mission trips, the church mission trip to Wilmington last summer; the Little Free Library; Central launching what became the anti-human trafficking ministry She's Somebody's Daughter - and the way you open the church to the community during downtown events and share the building with organizations like the Y and the Cumberland Valley School of Music. Ministries like PlaySchool Central - its brought me such joy to have the children in the building and to see the blessing that ministry is to the children and their families - this is all great, Kingdom of God stuff that you've done and our Lord is pleased with you. God is at work in and through this church.

And I'm grateful for your love and affection and how you've cared for, provided for, me and Susan. You are a loving and generous bunch and I thank God for you.

So much more to say here - I thank God for the elders who've served on Session and led this church with me during the last twelve years; I thank God for the Trustees, handling big jobs like repairing the steeple, replacing the HVAC to little things like undecorating the church after Christmas; I thank God for the beauty and diversity of worship - music from an organ, piano, banjo, keyboard, drums, violin, marimba, flute, clarinet, cello; dance and drama; I'm thankful for how you've supported me as I served in the community through the United Way and Racial Reconciliation and Homeless Matters; for your adaptability during COVID as we learned to worship remotely via livestream and then outdoors.

Here's how I see you, friends - this comes from Mike Yaconelli in his book, Messy Spirituality, where he writes about Moorhead, Minnesota, the home of Concordia College, which lies across the state line from Fargo, North Dakota, a very bleak part of the country (especially during the winter). All year, the community anticipates Concordia's annual Christmas concert. Each December, a huge choir and a full orchestra give a musical performance in the concert hall at the college. And every single year, the people in the community create a unique background for the concert - a one-hundred-by-thirty- foot mosaic.

Beginning in the summer, about six months before the concert, the community designs a new mosaic, rents an empty building, and the painting begins. Hundreds of people, from junior high schoolers to senior citizens, paint the mosaic. They paint by number on a large-scale design that has thousands of tiny pieces. Day after day, month after month, one little painted piece at a time, the picture on the mosaic gradually takes shape. When everyone has finished painting, an artist goes over the entire creation, perfecting the final work of art. When the mosaic is completed, they place it behind the choir. It has the appearance of an enormous, beautiful stained-glass window. The weekend of the concert, those people who helped paint arrive early, along with their friends and neighbors. Throughout the building, you can hear people whispering, "See that little green spot below the camel's foot? I painted it." Every year in the middle of the summer in Moorhead, Minnesota, thousands of unknown, ordinary people paint a tiny insignificant tile. Six months later, the result is a spectacularly beautiful masterpiece.

That's what's Central is to me, friends - that's what you're part of - God's masterpiece. All different kinds of people who together make a beautiful picture. Where you are loved, simply because you are a sister or brother in Christ. Not for who you are or what you have or your looks or station in life or anything else.

Isn't this what we crave the most? To be accepted and loved - without the pretending and posturing? With no more having to feel inadequate because of our gender or skin color or poverty or any other way the world judges us less? Where we loved and cared for when we're down and hurting? It's here, friends - I know it is - I've seen it among you, and you showed that love to me.

Forgive me

Goodbyes are also a good time to seek forgiveness. You already know that as of tomorrow I won't be your pastor anymore. The Presbyterian way is for me to go away and not to meddle in the affairs of Central. It's a wise policy. Your next pastor needs every bit of love and support you can give him or her and doesn't need the ghost of Scott Bowerman hanging around here. I'll still be your friend and I'll always love you, love this church, but I won't be your pastor anymore. So I need you to forgive me in advance for leaving you - and also to forgive me for my failures while I was here. There were times when I was distracted and didn't listen to you well enough, when I didn't hear or realize that you needed me, that I disappointed you with a boneheaded decision, that you disagreed with my theology, that I let you down. If that is the case, I ask your forgiveness so we can say goodbye without anything between us.

The Blessing

So to say goodbye - Thank You, Forgive Me, and Finally - a blessing.

May God, as Paul says to the Philippians, finish the good work he started in you - as a church 156 years ago, as individuals when he called you to faith - that you be equipped and strengthened to continue to be the marvelous congregation you are;

May God drench you with an outpouring of the Holy Spirit that you be filled with the love of God;

May the heart of Christ be found in you and may God lead you to share Christ's heart here from the heart of the city and beyond.

May you, in trying times, maintain the bond of unity in Christ, with him the center of your life together;

And - may God enable you to love your next pastor and family as you have loved Susan and me, and may God bless with you a pastor who deeply loves you.

And so, it's goodbye. God be with you my friends. I will hold you in my prayers, and my heart, as long as I live. In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, amen.
